The Walking School Bus committee met for the first time on Monday of this week to begin the process of developing some procedures and protocols for the day-to-day operation of the Walking School Bus e.g. creating a volunteer roster, identifying possible bus routes and stops, developing communication protocols for child sickness or inclement weather etc. At this early stage, the committee has decided that the Walking School Bus will operate one morning a week, with Monday being the best day, as this is when most volunteers are available to escort children to school. Two potential Walking Bus routes have been identified- one a northern route with the terminus at Donald Square and the other a southern route with the terminus at De Lacy Reserve. Further information will be communicated out to the school community in the coming weeks once all the necessary processes and protocols have been established. I would like to thank those members of the school community who have stepped forward to take this initiative 'On board'- please pardon the pun.

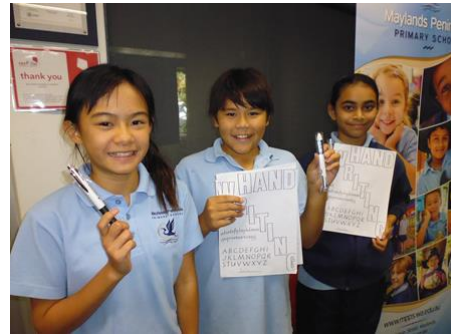

## Creative Play

### Safety and Risks

Often in schools we talk about students taking positive risks. Creative Play is a great example of a positive risk. Within the play time, children will experiment with items they are unfamiliar with, creating new uses for objects by “thinking outside the box”. Although children will be supervised, the possibilities are endless. Children will take a positive risk in trying new things, creating a new game, or climbing to a new height. This is the safe environment that children should be taking these risks. They will learn from their mistakes and push themselves to new levels, all while knowing that if they fail at one element in their play they will be able to pursue their idea and build their resilience.

“Play is great for children’s wellbeing and development. When planning and providing play opportunities, the goal is not to eliminate risk, but to weigh up the risks and benefits. No child will learn about risk if they are wrapped in cotton wool.”

## Foodbank 2015 Winter Appeal

Foodbank WA is again seeking the support of our school community for the 2015 Winter Appeal. Over 3000kg of tinned and packaged food for those in need was collected over the duration of last year's appeal.



The problem of food insecurity and hunger in WA might surprise you. Foodbank WA assists some 55,000 Western Australian's every month, but research shows that at least 16,000 people are left hungry because there is just not enough food in the welfare sector to meet demand. Around 40% are children living in some of the State's lowest income households.

Participating in the School Food Appeal is pretty simple and it's a great way to build community spirit, encourage philanthropy and directly help children, families, seniors and other disadvantaged people doing it tough.

Donation bins will be located in the Wet Area in each block for students to deposit their donations from Monday, 8 June to Friday, 12 June. Healthy winter foods such as soups, canned meals, tuna and other tinned fish and canned fruits and vegetables- basically all non-perishable packaged foods are just some of the items which will be gratefully received. Please help if you can.

## Bayswater \$WAP Program for May 2015

The Save Water and Power (\$WAP) program is a sustainable living initiative through Environment House



with funding support from the City of Bayswater. Environment House is a community environment centre with a focus on sustainable living.

During May, City of Bayswater residents can receive free and subsidised eco-hardware to reduce household energy and water consumption. The eco-hardware available includes:

- CFL light globes - FREE
- In-line Flow Controllers - FREE
- Advice from Environment House's Energy Auditor - FREE
- LED night lights - \$1

- Showerheads - \$5
- Weather Strips for draught proofing - \$5
- Power boards - \$10

However, stocks are limited and are available on a first come, first served basis.

The programme runs for the month of May 2015. The eco-hardware can be collected from Environment House on Saturday and Wednesday mornings during May from 9am to 12 noon. Residents must prove their eligibility by bringing their driver's licence or a bill with their name and address on it.

Free sustainability advice

Energy and water auditor Alan Benn will give advice on installing CFL light globes, LED night lights, water saving shower heads, inline flow controllers for showers, and weather strips to draught proof doors and windows.
